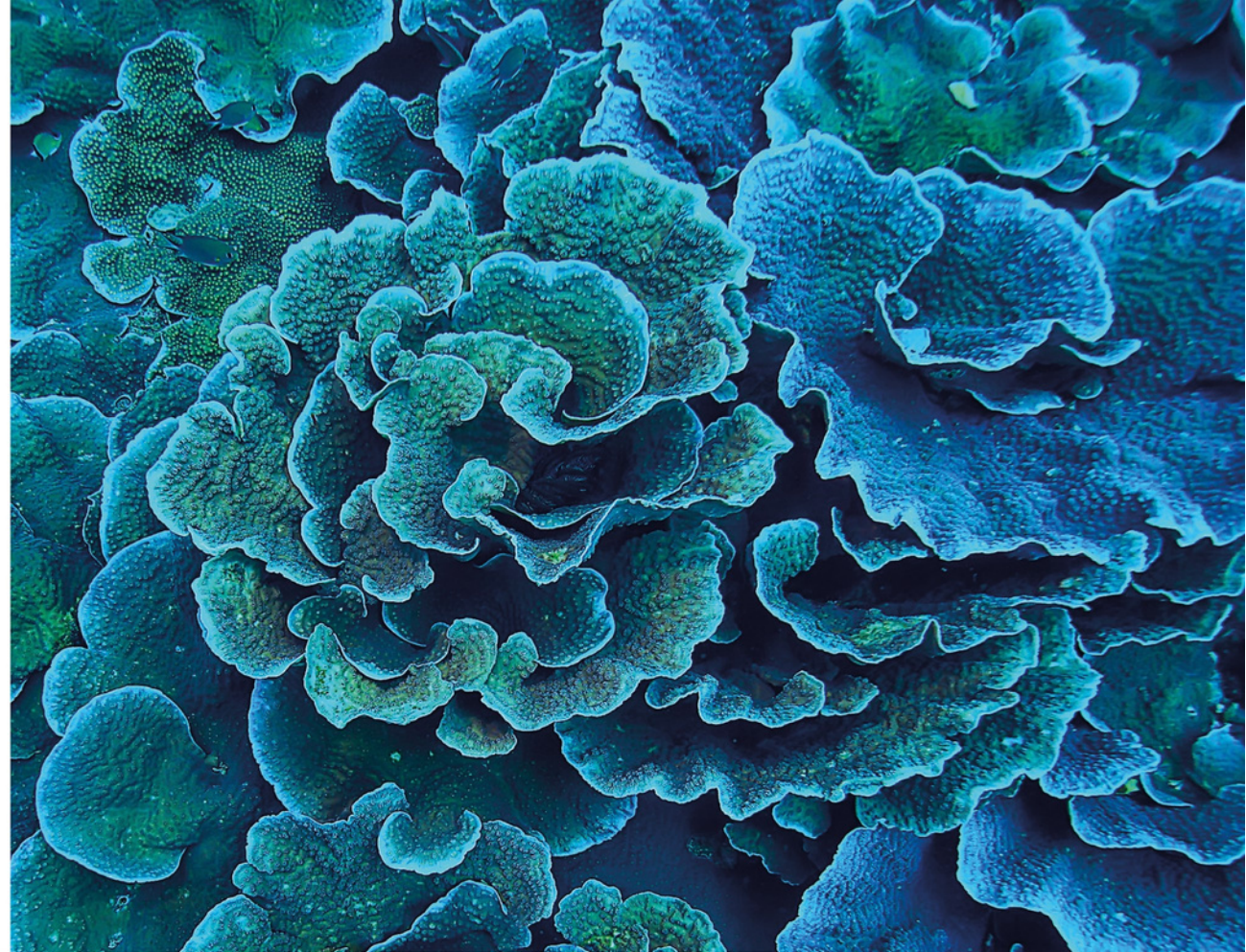

She is also a board member of SEPA, Scotland's Environment Protection Agency, and sits on its Audit and Risk Committee.

1. The Future of Work: Leading in a time of digital transformation

In this discussion we will be exploring the different use cases of AI for charities. The aim is to start from square one and discover, from charity leaders, which use cases would help and support the voluntary sector the most.
